NOTE TO SPECTATORS

SAFETY FIRST

Refrehments: Tailgating is very popular at a polo match, and the style and elaborateness of the picnics vary widely with the participants. Be sure to pack items that will travel well for a summer event.

Attire: You really can't be over or underdressed for a polo event. Spectators wear everything from shorts and jeans to high fashion. Wear comfortable shoes if you plan to go "divoting" at halftime, and don't forget your hat and sunscreen for protection.

Divot-Stomping: Divot-stomping is a long standing tradition at halftime (after the third chukker). Spectators wander all over the field, stomping down the turf that was kicked up by the horses during play. It's fun and you can meet great people just wandering the field. It also helps the groundskeepers.

Viewing: A polo match is fast and the playing field is large. Your best bet is to watch the main group of players clustered loosely around the ball. Keeping your eye on the ball is difficult at far ends of the field; if you have binoculars, bring them.

Polo Basics: Read on in this program to learn about the basics of the game – the positions, the penalties, and the ponies. If you aren't with a friend who knows a little about polo, ask the people around you what's happening. Many spectators love to help a new observer. If you've already made some studies of the game, you should be able to see the rules in action and recognize great play.

Questions: Please feel free to ask questions of players or officials. They love talking about their favorite sport!



Parking: Be sure to park only in designated parking spaces along the side of the field. Safety Zone: Always observe a "safety zone" of 30 feet along the sidelines at all times: the safety zone is to protect the spectator from flying balls and charging horses, and also allows fans room to walk past the cars and other spectators – and to spread a blanket or set up lawn chairs.

Remain Alert: Please remain alert at all times, especially when polo action is nearby. During play, keep your eye on the ball and horses, as action can extend beyond the edge of the playing field.

Children: Pease be aware of the whereabouts of small children. The direction of play can change in a split second.

Pets: Please keep pets leashed. Loose dogs may be a distraction - or even a hazard - to the match and spectators alike.



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The Field: The regulation polo field is 300 yards (think 3 football fields end to end) by 160 yards and the goal posts are placed 24 feet apart at each end. There is a "safety zone" of 30 feet along the sidelines behind which spectators should stay.

Chukker (Chukkar): A period of play with a maximum of seven and a half minutes elapsed time. At the end of seven minutes, a horn will sound to indicate that thirty seconds remain in the period. There are six chukkers in a match with a ten minute "halftime" after the third. Players change ponies during the short breaks between chukkers.

Goal: Scoring goals is obviously the purpose of the game. Anytime the ball crosses the line between the goal posts, it is a goal – regardless of whether a mallet or horse caused it to go through. Teams change ends of the field after every goal.

Line of the Ball: If you don't remember anything else about polo, remember this phrase: "The ball's path creates an imaginary line as it travels, and the player or players established in this line – behind or before the ball – have the right-of-way on the play." Most penalties involve a violation of the line. An opposing player may NOT cross directly in front of the player hitting the ball and can NOT cross the line without first bumping or riding off his opponent to the other side of the imaginary line.

Bump: A player is permitted to ride into another player so as to spoil his/her shot. The angle of collision must be no more than 45, and the faster the horse travels, the smaller the angle must be.

Ride-Off: Similar to the bump, the players attempt to push each other off the line of the ball to prevent a successful hit. The horses are the ones intended to do the pushing.

Hook: A player can interfere with another's shot by putting his mallet in the way of the striker's swing. However, it's a foul to hook too high or to reach over the other player's horse.

Knock-In: When an offensive player hits the ball over the back line, a defending player resumes the game with a free hit from their back line. No timeout allowed.

Out of Bounds: When the ball crosses the sidelines, play stops and is resumed when the opposing team is awarded a spot hit.

Throw-In: The umpire rolls the ball onto the field between lined-up teams to start or resume play.

Umpires: Two umpires are on the field, and in tournament play there is a designated third referee on the sidelines.

Ponies: Actually horses, are selected for their speed, agility and stamina. Many are thoroughbreds under sixteen hands, and many are mares because they are more aggressive.

Polo Basics & Terms

Divoting: The traditional half-time invitation to fans to walk on the field and "toe-in" the divots made by galloping horses. This repairs the field and provides an opportunity to socialize.

The Shots: Players execute shots from the "off" (right) side of the horse. With reins in the left hand and mallet in the right, the player is only holding on with his/her legs. Players stand in the stirrups when they hit the ball.

Fouls: When the umpire observes a foul, he/she blows a whistle, and the other team gets a penalty shot. The most common foul is crossing the line of the ball. Forty percent of all points in a match are scored from a penalty shot because of a foul.

Penalty: Players are penalized for moves that create dangerous situations for horse and rider. Depending upon the severity of the foul and where it occurred, the fouled team is allowed a free hit from a set distance from the goal.

Penalties & Handicaps

Penalty 1

Team fouled awarded a goal. The ball thrown in 10 yards from the goal without ends (of field) being changed.

Penalty 2 (Undefended)

Free (undefended) hit from 30 yards opposite, the center of the goal, or from the point of infraction - Captain's choice. Penalty 3 (Undefended)

Free hit from 40 yards. Defenders are to be positioned behind the end line and outside the goal posts.



Penalty 4

Free hit from 60 yards. Defenders must be positioned at least 30 yards from the ball.

Penalty 5

Free hit from center of the field, or where the foul took place. Defenders must be positioned at least 30 yards from the ball.

Penalty 6

A "safety" is awarded when the defending team hits the ball over their end line. A free hit is taken by the team fouled from a point 60 yards from the end line.

All players registered with the USPA are rated from -2 (novice) to 10 (the best) by a committee. (-2, -1, & 0 are also listed as C, B, & A respectively). The 0 rating is average, currently there are very few players in the world who are rated at 10.

Handicaps reflect skill and the value of the player to the team, not the number of goals he or she is expected to score. In handicap matches, each team adds up the ratings of its' players to arrive at a team rating. Any difference of the two teams' ratings is awarded as points to the lesser-skilled team at the beginning of the game. For instance, if a 12-goal team plays against an 11-goal team, then one goal is awarded on the scoreboard for the 11-goal team at the start of the match. Interestingly, in tournament play, "under-handicapped" players are highly valued as they do not count so much in the total team handicap.



Established in 1986, Maryland Polo Club has several members that have been around for 37 years in some capacity whether still playing, volunteering, or coaching. 

Polo Gear for Pony & Player



1 ~ The HELMET has a hard surface and is lined, strapped and many have face guards. The helmet protects a player from the ball and swinging mallets.

2 ~ **POLO SADDLES** are flatter than jumping saddles.

3 ~ Padded leather KNEE GUARDS offer protection.

4 ~ Brown or black **POLO BOOTS** offer rider protection.

5 ~ BRAIDED TAIL allows less interference with swinging mallets.

6 ~ The MALLET HEAD is made of tipa wood from Argentina. The ball is hit with the side of the head. The mallet is made of manua cane and is flexible.

7 ~ POLO PLATES are a special lightweight horse shoe. Made of iron, they have an inner rim and an outer rim. The inner rim is slightly higher than the outer one, making it easier for the hoof to pivot in all directions

8 ~ **BANDAGES** support and protect the pony's legs.

9 ~ **BREAST PLATE** keeps the saddle from slipping back.

10 ~ **POLO MARTINGALE** prevents the horse's head from going up and striking a player's face.

11 ~ DOUBLE REINS are attached to the sides of a bit in the horse's mouth and are held by a player's hands to turn and stop the pony.

12 ~ The POLO BRIDLE is used to control the horse.

13 ~ **ROACHED MANE** is a clipped mane and forelock to help prevent the mane from wrapping around the reins, as well as to prevent the mane from getting in a player's face.

Ponies & Player Positions

The Ponies..."Over seventy percent of a player's success on the field depends on the Horse he is riding. They are teammates, companions and friends." ~ unknown ~

The ponies, it is often said, contribute 70% to the success of their polo players, but many players will suggest that percentage is higher. The centuries-old close partnership of horse and rider are the essence of polo. An examination of the characteristics of these equine athletes reveals their key role in this very ancient sport. What, exactly, are polo ponies? First, they are actually horses. They are traditionally called ponies because when the game was encountered by the British in nineteenth-century Asia, it was being played on pony-sized mounts. A pony is under 14.2 hands (a hand being 4 inches, and height measured at the withers).

At first, the British kept this size standard, but now there are no size limits and full-sized horses are used. Most are mares, and many are thoroughbreds, with some quarter horses, or crosses of both, or other backgrounds. Many are compact, trim, and around 15-16 hands. In In Argentina, a major polo center, horses called Argentine are thoroughbreds bred specifically for polo, and this breeding frend is increasing in the U.S.



Most ponies are chestnut (brown) or bay (brown with black manes, tails and legs), but there are some grays,

blacks, roans (white-flecked), and paints. Their manes are shaved and their tails are braided and tied-up so they do not interfere with reins and mallets. They are not colts and fillies—it takes years to train a good polo pony.

Whatever their breeding, all must be quick, agile, and competitive. They must be able to race against another horse down the field, following the ball by making sudden stops or changes of direction.

They are taught to bump or push a rival horse off the line of the ball. They have to learn to take rein and leg cues from their riders and tolerate having mallets swung all around them, and perhaps the occasional hit by a ball. They move at a gallop, so they must have stamina.

Most ponies play only one seven-minute chukker, then are walked off the field to a rewarding cool bath, some water and a rest back at the trailers.

Position 1

This is an offensive player who is similar to a forward in hockey or soccer. An accurate hitter, he/she should be out in front and concentrating on scoring.

Position 2

Primarily an offensive player, he/she should be quick and aggressive with fast ponies. He/she supports the efforts of #1, and is often the second-highest rated member of the team.

Position 3

This player is like the quarterback and usually the team captain. Typically, he/she is the highest handicapped and most experienced player on the team. He/she is the pivot, and works to take possession of the ball from opponents. Good stick-and-ball control, accurate passing, and the ability to hit the longball are essential skills.

Position 4

This player is like the defensive back. He/she is the defender; there are no goalies in polo. A #4 has to be capable of turning a play, often with a good back shot, and returning the ball to his teammates.
